


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Wines of the Levant A Journey Through Lebanon, Israel and Cyprus Michael Karam Adam S. Montefiore Demetri Walters

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The three Levantine countries of Lebanon, Israel and Cyprus all have internal divisions and external tensions but share a common thread of history and tradition. This book looks at what unites the society, history and culture of these three countries by examining them through the prism of wine. The three writers show how the message of the vine can make us smile, give us hope and bring us together; how the grape endures despite instability and conflict, corruption and extremism and finally how wine can be a glorious metaphor for the generosity of the human spirit. The book will interest not just students of wine and wine enthusiasts but also those interested in learning more about the culture and society of these three countries.

Demetri's Master of Wine thesis was on Cypriot native grape varieties, which brought him back to his family background in the island's wines. He is a vocal advocate for Hellenic wine culture, and those of the Eastern Mediterranean.
